


It has been determined that there are structural problems with the north wing roof of the FDL school.

# Boys Record FDL's First District Win

The 1989-90 Ogichida boys basketball team posted a 3-16 regular season record. After opening with a 57-53 win at home over Nay-Ah-Shing, It was a long dry spell until January 20 when the team earned its second win, again at home versus White Earth. That score was "It was hard getting consistency early in the year due to missed practices and problems," says coach Levinski.

However, things turned around the second half of the year. The team switched to a man-to-man defense and for the most part was competitive the rest of the way. For example, they played an excellent game at Bug School but lost 71-66. They also lost twice to Silver Bay by 6 points each time.

Dan Aubid helped control the boards, and his offensive rebound for a basket late in the fourth quarter propelled FDL to the win.

Coach Sautbine said he was most pleased with the improvement of his inside people, specifically Shannon Mullen and Cindy DeFoe. Their rebounding and ability to score inside took some of the scoring burden off Mel Diver. Mel led the team with an average of nearly 26 points per game.

Team defense was also a factor for the team's improvement from its 7-9 record of a year ago. Chandra Mullen was the leader on defense. When Coach Sautbine used a box-and-one defense, it was usually Chandra who drew the responsibility of guarding the opposition's top player. "I asked a lot of her and she came through," says Sautbine.

A highlight of the season was when the girls defeated Red Lake for the championship of the Red Lake Tournament. Fond du Lac has won that event two of its three years in existence.

Another highlight came when the girls returned to Red Lake shortly after the tournament and pulled out an overtime win.

According to Coach Sautbine, however, the best game was against Floodwood. Even though the Ogichida lost, Sautbine believes that because they played an intense and solid game, his team learned to play at a higher level.

Unfortunately, the girls' season ended in the opening round of Distict play. Sauthine feels his team outplayed Silver Bay but their shots just wouldn't fall. The outside shooting was cold and it seemed contageous. The teamwork broke down and it turned out to be a long game for the Ogichida.
